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Please consider the following scenario and choose the best answer for each of the questions below it:

Mr. Thompson recently moved to an assisted care facility where he is now involved in an exercise program that is led by Annie, a physical therapist. Annie has noticed that, at times, Mr. Thompson has difficulty maintaining his balance. When asked about these balance problems, Mr. Thompson tells Annie that he frequently experiences these 'spells' but that they are usually short-lived.

After talking with Mr. Thompson about his balance issues, Annie decides to get in touch with his care provider, Dr. Simms. At first, Dr. Simms is resistant to Annie's comments and brushes her off, but Annie persists. She goes on to tell Dr. Simms that she is concerned about Mr. Thompson's safety. Dr. Simms responds by saying "Thanks for your input but I'm afraid that there isn't much I can do with the recommendations of an exercise instructor."

During Mr. Thompson's next exercise session, Annie again notes several occurrences of instability and remains concerned about the risk of Mr. Thompson falling. After the session, Annie calls Mr. Thompson's pharmacist and the pharmacist notes that Mr. Thompson recently started a new medication to help him sleep better in his new home. The pharmacist notes that this new medication has been associated with dehydration so he conference calls the dietician at Mr. Thompson's assisted care facility. Together, Annie, the pharmacist and the dietician construct a nutrition plan that has Mr. Thompson stable on his feet with a couple of weeks.
