Who offers Integrated Studies programs?

- Also called general studies, interdisciplinary studies, or university studies
- According to the Association for Interdisciplinary Studies,
 Arizona State University, Baylor University, Boston University,
 City University of New York, Emory University, Michigan State
 University, Oakland University, San Francisco State University,
 Seattle University, Texas Tech University, University of
 Connecticut, University of Nebraska-Omaha, and many others
 currently offer some form of an integrated studies degree.
- Between 2005 and 2010, the number of multi/interdisciplinary studies degrees awarded increased by 38% (National Center for Education Statistics).

What is my employment outlook?

- According to City University of New York, "Don't shy away from a self-designed interdisciplinary degree because of concerns it will not lead to a job! In alumni surveys, conducted annually, approximately 80% [of CUNY Integrated Studies] graduates report that they hold jobs in fields related to their areas of concentration."
