them. This summer, we didn't even have a chef applicant for the first 8 weeks of camp. So, I spent those 8 weeks in the kitchen cooking breakfast, lunch and dinner for 200+ people every day. It wasn't the most exciting experience I've had but it was definitely a learning experience that I will remember for the rest of my life. Now that camp is over, I wouldn't change how it went but I will say that my task this month and all months until next summer is to hire a chef. The campers and seeing how their lives are changed by camp and their interaction with staff and their peers without the distraction of technology is what keeps me here. As bad as it sounds, I love to see kids crying because they don't want to leave camp. It means that my staff and I have done something right!
