The multidisciplinary Learning and Leadership Doctoral Program equips participants with an understanding of the relationship that learning plays in the leadership process. The program philosophy supports the development of reflective practitioners in a variety of organizations and focuses on the interwoven nature of learning and leadership.

Faculty News

Dr. Steven R. Banks presented two papers at the Eastern Educational Research Association (EERA) conference in Sarasota, Florida, February 25-27, 2015. "The Effect of STEM Academy Instruction on State Assessment Scores" analyzed the effects of a STEM Academy instruction on a state assessment test. All participants had one or more of the following backgrounds: ethnic minority status, low socioeconomic level, ESL designation. Overall results showed that participation in the STEM Academy had a positive effect on the required state assessment. The most significant positive effect appeared on the mathematics scores of African American females who participated in the STEM academy. "Campus Housing, Gender and Graduation Rates at Community Colleges" determined the effect of campus housing on graduation rates in state community colleges. Data were collected on student graduation rates and campus from 448 state community colleges in the United States. The results indicated that graduation rates of public, two-year community colleges with housing were higher than those at public community colleges without campus housing. The results also revealed a possible interaction between gender and campus housing.

Dr. Hinsdale Bernard attended the *Teach Them Diligently Homeschool Convention* held in Nashville, TN, March 19-21, 2015. He represented the 3DPT Enterprises, LLC that showcased the patented Three-dimensional Periodic Table of the Elements (3DPT) developed by Dr. Bernard. The game **GroupPeriod** (targeting middle school students in particular) was also on display. The model and game both received very positive reviews from over 130 families who visited the booth in two days. The visitors saw the model and the game as welcome devices that could help stimulate interest in chemistry and STEM disciplines at an early age. For parents who may not be

interest in chemistry and STEM disciplines at an early age. For parents who may not be able to afford a 3-D model for their children, it was suggested that at least one unit could be used in a co-operative situation involving 10 -15 families who depend on an expert teacher to tutor their children in STEM and other challenging disciplines. This option for advancing the cause of chemistry education among the homeschool population will be further explored.

Dr. David W. Rausch and Dr. Elizabeth K. Crawford presented a session on

"Assessment of Graduate Program Culminating Projects: Utilizing the Learning Management System (LMS) for Organized Frameworks" at the *Southern Associate of Colleges and Schools: Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) Annual Meeting* in Nashville, TN, December 6-9, 2014. In the session, they shared methods and strategies for utilizing a Learning Management System to create an organized, measured, and transparent delivery for graduate assessment. They demonstrated the development of a framework for hosting individual course spaces (not bound by specific semesters) for participants of graduate level programs with culminating projects (portfolios, theses, dissertations, etc.). This fosters the implementation, maintenance, and assessment of student learning outcomes on an ongoing basis during the culminating project. This presentation was based on the Dissertation Course spaces developed for the Learning and Leadership doctoral candidates.

Admission News
