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
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Director's Welcome

As we wind down the 2015 Fall semester, our program is celebrating the start of 26 years of physical therapy education at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. We have changed over these years. In 1990, the program offered the state's second bachelor's degree program in PT. There were 24 students in the first class. One of our original students was Charles Williams. While he was in the first entry-level class, he was also in the last class of transitional doctoral students who graduated in 2014.





You may be wondering how we are going to accommodate all of these PT students (up to 108) and the doctoral students in occupational therapy (24 students/class with plans for 3 classes) in our current space in Davenport Hall. We are moving, and it is a very exciting time for UTC PT and OT! The University acquired two state office buildings adjacent to campus. The taller building faces McCallie Avenue, and I can actually see it from my office window. The building behind it is the Mapp Building, and it is much newer.

The address is E 8th Street. In December 2015, we will be moving into spacious accommodations on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Mapp Building. Our orthopedic lab will accommodate 60 students (36 PT + 24 OT) with room for an additional 10 students if we need to grow. We will also have a very nice lab to accommodate the medical/surgical and neurologic classes. An outdoor patio surrounds part of the 2nd floor. It will include a rehab garden with various surfaces to practice mobility (gravel, ramp, grass, etc.).

Our faculty welcomed Dr. June Hanks back home to Chattanooga this past year. As you may recall, she left to provide relief work after the earthquake devastated Haiti. Her teaching load is very similar to the previous one: therapeutic exercise, cardiopulmonary, anatomy, and medical/surgical aspects including wound care, orthotics/prosthetics, and lymphedema. We hired adjuncts to teach much of this content in her absence.



Summit Physical Therapy Named 2015 Best Mid-Sized Business

Summit Physical Therapy owners Dan Dotson and Kevin Kostka proudly took home the award for 2015 Best Mid-Sized Business by the Chattanooga Area chamber of Commerce. However, this small business started with just Dotson and Kostka. The idea for the joint clinic came about during their business plan project as third year physical therapy students at UTC in 2003.



The two went to business leadership training and opened up Summit Physical Therapy in 2008. Initially, they started with a geriatric population, but have since migrated towards sports medicine. Currently, their practice sees around 520 patients a week and has two locations in the Chattanooga area. Summit plans to open a third location in Ooltewah in late 2015.



This award was truly impressive and much deserved. The applicant and nomination pool for competing small businesses in the area exceeded the amount of previous years. Further qualifications to win included three years of company ownership, high degree of community involvement, success within the particular company's industry, and the applicants had to be chamber members. Welcome Class of 2018!

We were thrilled to welcome 36 new DPT students this August! The class of 2018 already boasts some impressive statistics. We received 263 applications from individuals who met our prerequisite criteria (out of 427 total!) Last September, 21 offers were made to students through the early decision process. Our class average for the cumulative undergraduate GPA is a 3.9 and science GPA is a 3.8. They also averaged slightly more than a 307 on the GRE. Our 28 Tennessee residents are joined by students from Georgia, Missouri, South Carolina, and Wisconsin. Six of our incoming students are UTC graduates; 17 are male and 19 are female.

UTC Introduces First White Coat Ceremonies



This past year, UTC began their first White Coat Ceremonies. This ceremony is traditionally used to honor the students and their success in entering a prestigious graduate level program in the medical profession. UTC decided that our students deserve to be honored for all of their hard work getting into such a competitive program and celebrate the beginning of the journey of earning their doctorates in physical therapy. However, this year we had not one but three white coat ceremonies! The white coat ceremony is typically performed for first years, but in order to honor our other current students in the second and third years, we had three separate services. The ceremonies took place in our very own Patten Chapel on UTC's campus. Chancellor Angle and Dean Valerie Rutledge greeted and congratulated the students and their families. Then, students were presented with a message, given their white coats, and recited the physical therapy oath together, along with any other physical therapist who was present. There was a very special opportunity for those students who were following in a parents footsteps in becoming a physical therapist to have their coat donned by their parent. There were four students who had the honor of having their parent don their white coat, pictured below. After the ceremony, students, their families, and loved ones were invited back to Davenport for refreshments and to tour the facilities and meet the faculty.





During the very first white coat ceremony honoring the class of 2015, Dr. Randy Walker gave the message. Dr. Walker spoke on the value of physical exercise, noting that it affects strength, motion, flexibility, coordination, stability, balance, endurance, cardiac and circulatory conditioning. More importantly, Dr. Walker focused on exercising the brain through maintaining competence and being dedicated to life-long learning, exercising integrity and behaving as professionals, and adhering to our professional code of ethics. He also addressed exercising compassion, listening to and be supportive of the needs of our patients and exercising fidelity, always being honest and loyal, behaving ethically. Finally Dr. Walker addressed exercising excellence and working at being better, always giving one's best.

The class of 2017's keynote speaker was Harvey Hillyer, one of the founders of Benchmark Physical Therapy. Using current billboard hit songs, Harvey Hillyer challenged the students in three areas. Harvey encouraged the students to "shake it off" when professionals outside our profession try to challenge their skill level. He also stated that students should be "all about that bass", expanding their knowledge of the profession as large as possible. Finally, he encouraged students to "let it go" and use the skills they have learned to their maximal potential.

The class of 2016 was the final ceremony this year. Their keynote speaker was Senator Bo Watson, who is also a physical therapist. Senator Watson spoke on the importance and magnitude of having the title of a physical therapist. Senator Watson addressed the fact that as a graduate of a doctorate level program, the community expects physical therapists to be informed, to be leaders, and to be difference makers. He enforced that as physical therapists, the students have a greater responsibility in representing the community around them. Finally, Senator Watson encouraged the students to always be involved in their state legislature and physical therapy association.

These ceremonies were a huge honor for the students and their families. We look forward to continuing the tradition of the white coat ceremonies for our first year students for years to come.

UTC DPT Welcomes Dr. Betsy Myers

UTC welcomed Dr. Betsy Myers, DHS, MHS, MPT, OCS, CWS, CLT in the Fall of 2015. Dr. Betsy Myers received a Masters of Physical Therapy from Northwestern University in 1992 and a Doctorate of Health Sciences with an emphasis in orthopedics from the University of Indianapolis in 2013. She is an orthopedic certified specialist and an advanced credentialed clinical instructor. She is also a certified wound specialist and a certified lymphedema therapist. Dr. Myers was a full-time instructor at the University of Indianapolis Krannert School of Physical Therapy from 1997 – 2000 and received the 1998 Teacher of the Year award. Dr. Myers is the author of



Wound Management: Principles and Practice, now in its third edition, as well as two chapters in the Integumentary Essentials: Preferred Physical Therapist Practice Patterns. She has given numerous local and regional presentations on wound management,



orthopedics and oncology. Dr. Myers has worked in a variety of clinical settings within regional hospital systems including: acute care, transitional care, a rehabilitation unit, general out-patient care, sports medicine, aquatic therapy, and a diabetic foot clinic. She joined the outpatient physical therapy staff at Saint Francis Health System in Tulsa, OK in September, 2008. Her current projects include adding to her publications on hop testing in athletes, preparing for a cycling century, and training her dog, Lexi, to be a therapy dog.

We welcome Dr. Myers and are excited to have such an experienced individual join the team of professors here at UTC!

Serving Through Presence

While on sabbatical leave of absence from UTC in 2001, Dr. Hanks lived in Les Cayes, Haiti to start the Haiti Advantage Program, a physical rehabilitation assistance program consisting of a clinic, artificial limb and brace fabrication workshop, and supportive services for people with disabilities and special needs. During the years after, she directed the program and led many short-term medical team trips with UTC physical therapy students, alumni and other health care professionals. In January 2010, just after returning from a teaching seminar in Haiti, Dr. Hanks heard the devastating news of the earthquake that tore apart the greater Port-au-Prince area of Haiti. Within a week, Dr. Hanks was back in Haiti, working nearly nonstop alongside volunteer doctors, nurses and other health professionals to manage patients with terrible wounds, amputations, fractures and crush injuries. The number of patients continued to grow and the need for extensive physical rehabilitation began to soar. After much internal debate and struggle, she decided to resign her teaching position at UTC to live and work full time in Haiti. As founder and director, her plate was full as she supervised the clinic work and staff, managed volunteers, trained the national rehabilitation staff, wrote grants to support the program, and sought donations. During this time, several new programs were initiated to include a soccer team for young men with amputation and a sewing group for young women with disabilities. Thousands of people have benefited from the physical rehabilitation and supportive care provided by the program. Through somewhat a miracle of circumstances, Dr. Hanks was able to turn the Haiti Advantage Program over to an occupational therapist from Chile and return to teaching in the physical therapy program at UTC in August 2014. Dr. Hanks is grateful for the incredibly challenging and rewarding experience in Haiti and for the opportunity to teach again at UTC. Welcome back Dr. Hanks!

Dr. Cathie Smith awarded the Inaugural Pioneer Award for Neonatal Therapy



Dr. Cathie Smith was awarded the inaugural 2015 Pioneer Award for Neonatal Therapy and was also named 2015 TPTA Physical Therapy Educator of the Year. The Pioneer Award for Neonatal Therapy award is through the National Association of Neonatal Therapists and was created "to honor neonatal occupational therapists, physical therapists and speechlanguage pathologists who have contributed tirelessly to establish and advance the specialized field of neonatal therapy." Nominations for this award were solicited from clinicians across the United States and Europe from the disciplines of physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language pathology. All three of these disciplines have contributed significantly to the development of best practice standards for therapy services in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, making this recognition even more significant for Dr. Smith. In addition to receiving the 2015 NANT Pioneer Award, Dr. Smith was also selected to receive the Tennessee Physical Therapy Association 2015 PT Educator of the Year award. Congratulations, Dr. Smith, on these impressive accomplishments.

Faculty & Staff Updates



Dr. Nancy Fell is the current Secretary of the Neurology Section and is actively working on multiple large grants. She is on sabbatical this fall to focus on research and grant activity.

Dr. Jeremiah Tate had a very busy this year teaching two new courses (Kinesiology and Musculoskeletal Disorders of the Upper Extremity) while continuing to teach Human Gross Anatomy and Musculoskeletal Disorders of the Lower Extremity. Dr. Tate continues to stay busy in the motion lab working on research studies aimed at reducing impact forces via gait retraining and analyzing relationships between hip and trunk kinematics during the single leg hop test and hip strength. He attended CSM in Indianapolis, presenting a poster on Frontal Plane Projection Angle Reliability and also spoke on current intervention strategies for patellar tendinopathy. Dr. Tate was recently awarded a UC Foundation professorship. He and Dr. Hanks have worked closely together this spring to deliver the orthopedic and therapeutic exercise content in joint labs. His twin boys, Elliot and Isaac (5) began kindergarten this past year and Graham (3) has been keeping his wife Amanda on her toes at home.





Dr. Sue Barlow started her second year of teaching in the PT department in the fall of 2014. She taught Musculoskeletal Assessment and Differential Diagnosis for the first time. Dr. Barlow implemented some great instructional changes into the curriculum (flipped classroom in musculoskeletal assessment and JIGSAW in differential diagnosis) this year after attending a faculty teaching retreat just for physical therapists. She also taught Basic Skills again this year in the fall semester. In the spring she taught Neuro II and Med Surg III keeping her very busy with teaching both semesters. She was able to initiate her research aimed at identifying the region of the brain responsible for acute hypertonicity after cerebrovascular accident last year. This work was accepted and presented as a poster at the 2015 Combined Sections Meeting in Indianapolis in February. In her spare time Dr. Barlow enjoys running and being Gia's Mom.

Dr. Randy Walker was recently elected to the TPTA Nominating Committee.

Dr. Randy Walker has been serving for 2 years as the Interim Dean of the Graduate School. He was awarded the Roger Brown and Carolyn Thompson Award by the University for his continued pro bono physical therapy services at the Volunteers in Medicine Clinic.

We are excited to have welcomed Betsy Myers, PT, DHS, MHS, MPT, OCS, CLT, CWS to our PT faculty. Dr. Myers is the author of the wound care textbook that we use in our program! She will be collaborating with Drs. Tate and Hanks as we deliver a strong orthopedic preparation for our students this semester.

Our elective courses have changed over the years. This fall semester, Connie Petty, PT, ATC, CHT and Bryan Clary, DPT are co-teaching a sports elective that includes coverage at football and soccer practices and games/meets, Saturday morning injury clinics, physician office visits, and surgery observations. Chris Myers, PT, DPT, OCS, Cert. MDT is leading a manual therapy elective this fall. She is completing a fellowship through Evidence in Motion (EIM).

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
