2. In the space provided below, please personally react to the graphic novel indicating any aspects of the work you particularly liked or didn't like, providing short rationales for any observation you make.
3. In the space provided below, please indicate how you might use this novel in a class or facilitate its use by other teachers.
4. In the space provided below, if you have any specific questions about the period of Chinese history described in this novel, please include them. I have taught the history of China for a long time (although I learned to think of Chinese history in different ways because of the novel) and if I don't know the answer should be able to provide you with a source where you can find your answer. Feel free to list the questions.
