This list is an example of special circumstances and does not include all possible scenarios. There may be other types of documentation that are acceptable. Please make sure the dates on the documentation coincide with the dates you received Pell Grant funds and did not earn academic credit. Submitting an explanation with supporting documentation *does not quarantee* financial aid eligibility will be reinstated.

	Signed statement from pastor or counselor (on letterhead)
	Copy of lease showing only yourself as the renter
	School records showing different household for father/mother
Job schedule conflict	Signed statement of schedule change or overtime hours worked from employer(on
	letterhead)
	Timesheets – must have company name printed on them
Childcare problems	Signed letter from current daycare center (on letterhead) verifying enrollment of the child.
	If it the day care provider is a personal friend or relative, the letter must be accompanied
	by one other signed letter from a friend or family member aware of the situation.
Victim of a crime or unexpected disaster	Must include copy of police report, third-party letters, etc.
Military obligations	Copy of military orders or signed letter from your commanding officer
Never Attended	Instructor verifications of non-attendance or enrollment verification from another
