1. Description of proposed changes

Systematic review of staffing, completion data, curriculum and outcomes has lead to this proposal to stabilize offerings, ensure meeting of program learning objectives, and streamline completion of the major without compromise to quality.

The catalog description will not substantively change, rather through changes to pre- and co- requisites, students will be able to the complete major in 2 years. The proposed changes to pre-/co-requisites and the new course rotation offer sequential progress that allow students to take a 4000-level course in the spring following preparation at the 3000-level in the fall and thereby allow students to take one 4000 in each of the two years of their upper division work. By identifying which courses deliver which skills and knowledge through curriculum mapping and review of outcome assessment data, the following changes are proposed:

- --change title and co-requisites to FREN 3210 and FREN 3220 Advanced Grammar I and II
- --change the pre-/co-requisites for FREN 3110 and FREN 3120 Conversation and Composition I and II
- --create a 3000 level special topics class for elective credit
- --change title and pre-requisite on 4010
- --create rotation for courses in French program based on current staffing to be added to catalog and website

2. Rationale for requested change

Include data from the annual institutional effectiveness cycle or outcomes assessment; information on changes in disciplinary field(s); national, community and workforce development trends; and address any impact on enrollment trends.

To stabilize rotation of course offerings, ensure meeting of program learning objectives, and streamline completion of the major in two years (after completing the 2-year preparatory sequence of 1010-1020 and 2110-2120), the Department of Modern and Classical Languages and Literature reviewed the curriculum map, outcomes data, course completion data, petition data, program completion data and use of resources to determine a clear path through the French major, given current staffing, without compromising skills or knowledge. Moreover, significant money will be saved because fewer upper division courses need be offered, not to mention equitable workloads from avoiding independent studies.

The current catalog requirements, curriculum map, and course rotation require students to complete all courses in the 3000-level sequence before advancing to their two required 4000-level electives. Thus it currently hinders student completion of the major because a) 4000-level electives are typically offered one semester per academic year due to student demand/staffing needs, b) students who study abroad frequently do not place into the equivalent of 4000-level electives and thereby return needing more 4000-level credits than are offered in their senior year, and c) this results in a regular need for independent studies that could be avoided if the 3000-level pre-requisites are relaxed.

Two year rotation:

AY1 Fall: 3110 & 3310; Spring: 3120, 3500, 4000 AY2 Fall: 3210 & 3320; Spring: 3230, 3240, 4000

In order to implement this new rotation, FREN 3110 & 3120 must be offered without being tethered through pre-/co-requisites to FREN 3210 & 3220. Offering them in alternate years allows students to focus on written expression in both years of their upper-division work, and encourages the organic development of advanced written proficiency, whereas our current curriculum rotation limits written expression to two intensive classes during the same academic year, which may hinder some students from reaching advanced written proficiency in the language.

Likewise FREN 4010 needs to be made available in both years of the rotation, and to ensure student success FREN 4010 thus must now require the requisite introduction to literature and one of the two intensive courses on written expression (either FREN 3310 or 3320 and either FREN 3110 or 3210, depending on which AY of the rotation they begin). Finally, the addition of a second elective course such that there is an elective available in each year of the two-year rotation ensures students can complete the 27 required hours in a two-year cycle regardless of when or where they enter the cycle.

We believe these changes accommodate most every contingency while assuring students meet program outcomes in two years.




