Veronica Tetterton, PhD: "My Life as a Psychologist in a Women's Prison: It's Not All CSI and Orange is the New Black"

Chief of Operations of Anticipate Joy
Dr. Veronica Tetterton is a licensed clinical psychologist with experience in mental health, trauma, and substance abuse counselling. She worked for the Federal Bureau of Prisons as Trauma Treatment Coordinator and Residential Drug Abuse Treatment Coordinator and was one of the first people to start a trauma treatment program for female offenders. She is also the co-founder of Anticipate Joy, which is a mental health-focused company which provides affordable professional counseling services. The focus of her

as women and gender studies. She is a published au-



thor and an award winner for her book, Set the World on Fire: Black Nationalist Women and the Global Struggle for Freedom . The main topic of her presentation will be on Black global activism and, in particular, the politicization and organization of Black women activists globally, but especially during the Great Depression. #### Feminista Jones: "Intersectionality in Practice" Tuesday, March 16th, 5:00pm via Zoom Social Worker, Author, Activist

Feminista Jones is a third-wave feminist and media personality whose work on the promotion of Black feminism has earned her much recognition. She is the author of four books as well as a freelancer who has written for several publications including the *New York Times*, *Time* magazine, and the *Washington Post*. She strives to promote the voices of Black women from all backgrounds through the use of social media, which is the subject of her most famous book, *Reclaiming Our Space*:



How Black Feminists Are Changing the World from the Tweets to the Streets. The main focus of her presentation will be on how to take the idea of intersectionality from just a theory to something in the real world and more specifically, the lived experience of intersectionality. ## Tiffany Florvil, PhD: Afro-diasporic Kinships: Audre Lorde and Black German Women

Dr. Florvil is Professor of 20th-century European Women's and Gender History at the University of New Mexico. Her specialties are primarily in the history of post-1945 Europe and the African and Black diaspora, as well as gender and sexuality. Her publication, *Mobilizing Black Germany: Afro-German Women and the Making of a Transnational Movement*,

is the first full-length study of the history of the modern Black German movement. The focus of her presentation will be on diasporic kinships and Caribbean American feminist, Audre Lorde, and her role in the Afro-German movement.
