I'm an AP Psychology teacher from Memphis, TN, home of Elvis and barbeque! I have taught five AP subjects and two International Baccalaureate subjects, including IB Psychology during my 32 years as a public-school teacher in the Memphis, TN area. AP Psychology is by far my favorite! I have taught AP Psychology for 22 years and served the College Board as a reader and table leader for the AP Psychology exam for 12 years. In addition, I have been a multiple-choice question writer for the AP Psychology exam and a member of the national development committee creating the national Psychology praxis exam for the Educational Testing Service. Most recently, I served on the Free Response rubric development committee for the national AP Psychology exam.

While working for Shelby County Schools I served as a district workshop leader and department chair, Advanced Placement department chair, Psychology curriculum writer, and National Endowment for the Humanities fellowship recipient. In addition, I have worked on numerous Superintendents' Advisory committees as well as the Tennessee Governor's Round Table for Education.

After 34 years in public education, I now teach at St. Agnes Academy in Memphis and in my spare time I host the How To Love Lit literature podcast with my wife, an AP English teacher and APSI English Language consultant. And for fun I work in the Memphis area as a professional musician!

This workshop is designed for both new and experienced AP Psychology teachers and will include discussions on current changes in the CED and test construction, essay writing, content planning, resources and organizational themes that hopefully will help strengthen participant's programs. Particular attention will be paid to teaching strategies, multiple choice question construction and free response essay writing that reinforce skills reflected on the AP exam. We will examine projects, activities, materials, and exercises as well as essential vocabulary that promote exam preparedness. This will be an interactive seminar that includes materials supplied by me for various topics but also will draw upon your expertise and successful strategies you have created in the past.
