Responsible Use of AI in all Coursework

We support the use of AI tools as both a starting point and editing and refinement of existing assignments. This policy outlines the use of AI in Applied Leadership & Learning (LEAP) coursework and how AI can be responsibly integrated while ensuring that your voice and critical thinking remain central.

AI as a Starting Point: Tools like ChatGPT or other AI tools can be useful for generating research ideas, prompts, or organizing your thoughts. However, there should be a balance, and the essential skills identified in course outcomes must be accomplished by the student. Many of our course assignments require not just knowledge of readings and instruments but also personal reflection and connection to your professional practice.

Editing and Refinement: While AI can offer suggestions, the edits should be yours. After the initial AI input, revisit your assignment and weave in course materials, personal reflections, and real-life examples. These are critical to strengthening your work and demonstrating your learning competence.

AI Grammar Tools

Microsoft Word, Grammarly, and other similar software, can help improve grammar, spelling, and overall flow. However, simply accepting suggestions without specific review may cause your assignment to be identified as AI-generated. We encourage reviewing suggestions carefully and making the changes yourself to reflect your thinking and analysis.

Citation and Integrity

If you use AI-generated content directly in your work (copying and pasting specific text), proper attribution of the quote is required. Follow UTC's Honor Code and ensure that AI direct contributions are used sparingly and appropriately cited. This reflects academic integrity and transparency in your work. This policy ensures students remain engaged in reflective work and critical thinking while incorporating AI tools effectively.

Deviation from this policy is considered unpermitted use of AI technology and a form of academic misconduct, which violations are subject to the UTC student code of conduct.
