Program Syllabi Statements for Traditional BSN

Change Statement

This syllabus is subject to change depending on student learning needs and other circumstances. If absent from class, it is the student's responsibility to keep informed of announcements and changes made during class time. Students are expected to check the Announcements in the UTC Learn Course regularly.

Grade Scale

In order to pass Nursing courses that carry letter grades, a grade of at least 78% must be achieved. The grading scale is as follows:

Rounding Policy

During each semester, all grades will be recorded to two (2) decimal places. At the end of the semester, the final grade will be calculated to two (2) decimal places and rounded mathematically:

- a. Less than 0.50 – Round down to next whole number, example 91.49 = 91
- b. 0.50 or greater – Round up to next whole number, example 91.50 = 92”(

Clinical Requirement Policy

Documentation of clinical requirements is to be turned into the School of Nursing advisor by 5:00pm on December 15 for the spring semester, May 1 for summer semester and August 1 for the fall semester. Clinical requirements may not expire during the semester. Failure to have all of the clinical requirements current in your clinical file and verified by the School of Nursing by 5:00pm on the first day of class of the semester will result in one clinical absence. A second clinical absence will be earned if the missing/expired clinical requirement is not submitted and verified by the first Friday of the semester. Two clinical absences resulting from either missing or expired clinical requirements will result in a failing grade in all clinical courses for the semester. If a student withdraws from the nursing program for a semester or more, the background check and drug screen must be repeated prior to returning to the nursing program.

Academic Policies

Students in the Nursing major may earn a grade of “D” or “F” or “NC” in only one course with a nursing (N) designation. If a student earns a second “D”, “F”, or “NC”, the student will be dismissed from the program, even if the second “D”, “F”, or “NC” is earned in the same semester as the first failed grade.

Students who do not complete a course, or who make a grade of “D”, “F”, or “NC”, in an undergraduate nursing course, and who are eligible to repeat a course, are permitted to register for that course on a space-available basis. If there are more students than positions available, the student(s) with the highest nursing major GPA will be given priority for the position(s) available. To be considered for progression the student must submit a letter of intent to the ABSN Professional Advisor within 5 business days of grades being posted.

Students who must withdraw from a nursing (N) course for medical reasons must submit a signed letter from their physician stating they cannot continue in the nursing courses for medical reasons. Students with a medical withdrawal will be allowed to return to the semester they withdrew from once the student submits a release from the physician.

If a student wishes to withdraw from a nursing course for non-medical reasons, s/he must withdraw from all the nursing courses for the semester s/he is enrolled. Students withdrawing for non-medical reasons will only be allowed to re-enroll in the nursing courses on a space available basis. If there are more students than positions available, the student(s) with the highest nursing major GPA will be given priority for the position(s) available. To be considered for progression the student must submit a letter of intent to the ABSN Professional Advisor within 5 business days of grades being posted.

Reapplication to the School of Nursing is required for students who withdraw from semester 1 nursing courses for causes other than documented medical, personal or family reasons. Students must submit a completed application packet by the published application deadline in order to be considered for readmission. Enrollment is limited and the number of qualified applicants often exceeds the number of students who can be admitted. Previous admission does not guarantee acceptance.

If in the judgment of the professor there is reason to question the emotion or physical condition of a student or the safety or quality of nursing care provided, the professor has the right and obligation to exclude the student from the clinical area

Testing Accommodations

Students registered with the Center for Student Accessibility (CFSA) who wish to utilize their approved testing accommodations will need to test in the CFSA to receive those accommodations. Students will have the opportunity to select from two options: Individual (one-on-one) proctoring services with direct screen monitoring capabilities, or use of a university-issued device during examination periods. In circumstances where individual proctoring services cannot be provided, all SON students will be required to complete their examinations using a university-issued device. Testing hours are between 8:00AM-5:00PM. Students may request testing accommodations through the [CFSA Accommodate system](#) at least three business days in advance.

Students with time accommodations must notify the BSN Academic Advisor, April-Anderson@utc.edu, to apply these accommodations to their ATI account. Notifications must be requested at least three days prior to the ATI exam. Time accommodations cannot be applied after a student begins an ATI exam.

Simulation

Simulation Pre-work: Students will complete all required preparation for the experience BEFORE they will be allowed to participate. This includes reading assigned chapters and written assignments. Students may not participate in simulation without completion of the prework assignment, NO EXCEPTIONS.

Post-Simulation Assignment: Students will complete a reflection assignment and submit it via Canvas Dropbox within 72 hours upon completion of the simulation experience. Failure to submit this assignment within the allotted time will result in an Incomplete and the student will have 24 hours to resubmit. Failure to resubmit by the extended time will result in a No Credit for simulation.

Evaluation: The Lasater Clinical Judgment rubric is used to evaluate students' demonstrations of clinical judgment behaviors for the clinical simulation experience. The feedback provided will be documented in the scoring rubric.

Clinical Attendance: Simulation: Any arrival after 8:00 a.m. (8:01-8:29 a.m. - or scheduled sim start time) for simulation shall be considered tardy. Students who are tardy must report to the Simulation Technician (David Thompson) or Simulation Operations Specialist (Michelle Rosano) to fill out a "Simulation Attendance Verification Form". Students who arrive 30 minutes or later for the simulation will not be allowed to participate and will be given an absence for the clinical day.

Recording in Class

Students may not record audio or video in any classes without the prior approval of faculty and students. (Approved by Faculty Committee 5/6/13)

Statement on Academic Integrity and Conduct

Students are expected to perform according to the standards of academic honesty and integrity as outlined in the School of Nursing and University of Tennessee at Chattanooga policies. As stated in the University of Tennessee Student Handbook, "To plagiarize means to take someone else's words and/or ideas (or patterns of ideas) and to present them to the reader as if they are yours." (See University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Student Handbook for definitions, policies and judicial procedures).

Students must abide by the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Honor System regarding Academic Dishonesty (refer to University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Student Handbook). Students may not give or receive help on any test from any other student. Students may not discuss the content of any tests with other students until all students have taken the test. This includes students who may have missed the scheduled test time due to illness or emergency.

Students will be held to these standards in all areas of academic performance. If a student is found to be in violation of any academic dishonesty, s/he may be placing themselves at risk for School of Nursing program dismissal.

Plagiarism and Cheating Declaration (This should appear under the grading criteria in the syllabus)

Students will write and/or type one of the following statements on every nursing exam and assignment:

"I affirm that I have neither given nor received unauthorized aid on this quiz/exam/test." OR "I affirm that this assignment reflects my own honest work and was completed with the integrity expected of me and my profession."

The student will also be required to sign the statement.

Clinical Course Check Off

Students must successfully perform the skills, procedures and competencies assigned to the level in order to successfully complete the clinical portion of the course/courses within the level. If the student is not successful, the skill(s) must be repeated at a time determined by level faculty prior to clinical experiences at the level. The student not successful on the first checkoff will remediate with level faculty prior to the second attempt. If the skill competency is not met after retesting, the student will complete a detailed remediation plan with faculty. All unsatisfactory grades on the clinical evaluation tool must be resolved per timeline in the detailed remediation plan.

Midterm Academic Advising

This policy outlines a structured midterm intervention process designed to academically support nursing students. Faculty members teaching didactic courses identify and contact students performing below the 80% threshold at midterm and connect these students to the BSN Academic Advisor. The Academic Advisor takes responsibility for reaching out to each identified student via email, providing them with clear information about their academic options. Follow-up Support: Additional meetings can be scheduled based on either the student's need for guidance or the advisor's assessment that further discussion would be beneficial.

Dosage Calculation Exam Policy f

LEVEL 1: Two proctored Fundamentals dosage calculation exams are required in this clinical course and a third proctored Fundamentals dosage calculation exam will be offered. Students must score at least an 88% on one of the three dosage calculation exams in order to meet clinical course objectives and earn a "Met" on the clinical performance evaluation tool in the area of Math Competency and a Satisfactory (S) in the course. If a student scores less than 88% on the first ATI dosage calculation exam, then the student will be required to complete all ATI modules for the dosage topics covered on that exam prior to being allowed to take the second ATI dosage calculation exam. If a student scores less than 88% on the second ATI exam, the student will be required to attend a faculty-led workshop (the date/time for the workshop will be announced after the first dosage calculation exam) prior to being allowed to take the third ATI dosage calculation exam. If the student, on the third attempt of the ATI dosage calculation exam, receives a score of less than 88%, this will result in the Math Competency being "Not Met" on the final clinical evaluation tool and the student will not be able to meet clinical course objectives and will earn an Unsatisfactory (U) in the course.

Prior to taking the dosage calculation exams, it is strongly recommended students complete the following modules, content, activities and tests under the Dosage Calculation and Safe Medication Administration 4.0 modules on www.atitesting.com (recommended to utilize the dimensional analysis method):

- Safe Medication Administration (ATI recommended completion time is 45 minutes)
- Medication Administration (30 minutes)
- Oral Medications (1 hour 25 minutes)
- Injectable Medications (1 hour 25 minutes)
- Powdered Medications (30 minutes)
- Dosage by Weight (3 hours)

LEVEL 2-4: The first ATI dosage calculation exam will be administered during the first week of the semester. If a student scores 88% or above there is no further testing required for the semester. If less than 88% it is strongly recommended that the student review ATI modules and ATI test report related to areas of improvement.

The second ATI dosage calculation exam will be administered during the second week of the semester to those who scored below 88% on the first exam. If a score of 88% or above is achieved on the second exam, no further testing is needed for that semester. If the second dosage calculation and safe medication exam score is below 88%, a clinical performance plan must be completed by midterm.

The third ATI dosage calculation exam must be administered prior to midterm and a score of 88% or above must be achieved to meet clinical course objectives. A score of < 88% on the third ATI dosage calculation exam will result in an Unsatisfactory (U) on the final clinical evaluation tool.

- **Level 2 ATI Dosage Calculation Exam:** Level 2 students will take the proctored ATI Nursing Care of Children dosage exam. To prepare for the exam, it is recommended students complete the following module, content, activities and tests under the Dosage Calculation and Safe Medication Administration 4.0 module on www.atitesting.com (recommended to utilize the dimensional analysis method):
 - Parenteral (IV) Medications
 - Pediatric Medications
- **Level 3 ATI Dosage Calculation Exam:** Level 3 students will take the proctored Adult Medical Surgical dosage exam. To prepare for the exam, it is recommended students complete the following module, content, activities and tests under the Dosage Calculation and Safe Medication Administration 4.0 module on www.atitesting.com (recommended to utilize the dimensional analysis method):
 - Critical Care Medications
- **Level Four:** Level 4 students will take the proctored ATI Critical Care dosage exam. To prepare for the exam, it is recommended students complete the Dosage Calculation RN Critical Care Online Practice Assessment 4.0.

LEVEL 5: There is no ATI dosage calculation exam administered to level 5 students. It is recommended that students review all content from previous modules, activities, and practice tests prior to attending clinical.

Nurs 4555: Clinical attendance is mandatory. Students report to an assigned community service learning site and are guided by designated onsite staff. Nonfulfillment of clinical assignments and/or nonattendance at weekly clinical conferences may not allow the student to meet course objectives leading to an unsatisfactory clinical grade and ensuring a failing overall course grade. In the event of an absence a student may discuss the possibility of a makeup assignment with clinical faculty. If a student has not told the clinical instructor s/he will be absent and is not located

where s/he is scheduled the student's grade will be in jeopardy. The clinical instructor will present the information to level faculty and a decision will be made about the student's course grade. Students follow the tardiness policies of the assigned community site.

Tardy, Absence. Students who arrive after the designated clinical laboratory start time will be considered tardy. Two (2) tardy arrivals to the clinical lab will be counted as one (1) absence. Two (2) absences will result in a failing grade for the course. Any student arriving at the clinical site after the designated start time may be sent home and receive an absence for the day. In the event that a student has to depart from clinicals early for illness or an emergency, the student may receive an absence for the day.

Nurs 4570: Students are expected to complete all required clinical days with their assigned preceptor in the clinical setting. Students who are absent from clinical practicum will be required to make up the missed time in accord with the preceptor's schedule and with the approval of the course faculty. If in the clinical judgment of the preceptor or faculty, the student is unprepared to assume patient care and/or meet the objectives of the clinical experience, the student will receive an unsatisfactory evaluation for the day and will be dismissed from clinical site. Two unsatisfactory evaluations will not allow the student to meet course objectives and will result in **no credit and thus an unsuccessful attempt of the course [NC/F and thus failure of the course.]** If the student earns 2 unsatisfactory evaluations, s/he will not be allowed to return to the clinical site for the remainder of the semester. Students who work a preceptorship shift on a day faculty have not approved, will receive an Unsatisfactory for the day and the hours will not be counted. According to School of Nursing policy, 2 Unsatisfactory days will result in a grade of NC in the course.

Tardy/Absence Policy. Students are expected to begin their shifts at the official starting time of the unit. They must be present and ready to assume patient care at the start of report. Students who arrive after the designated clinical site start time will be considered tardy. Two (2) tardy arrivals to the clinical site will count as one absence which must be made up.
